

## BACK CAST

### AUGUST MEETING

Being a member of Colorado Women Flyfishers has countless benefits and one that sits among the top of the list is having Pat Barz as one of our members. Pat spoke at our August meeting on The Rocky Mountain Angling Club. The club was started in 1992 by Dan Hart with the idea of giving anglers self-guided access to quality fishing waters, located in Colorado, Wyoming, and New Mexico.

Dan's idea is proving to be successful enough that the original 10 properties have grown to 51. The property owners dictate the rod fees, how many anglers are allowed at one time and what days the property is available to fish. These are working cattle ranches, so no dogs are allowed, and all waters are catch and release with barbless hooks.

On occasion, a ranch will be sold and the water is no longer available, but the idea is spreading among land owners by word of mouth, and new properties are being considered continually.

To become a member of the club there is a one-time membership fee\*, annual dues (currently \$105.00 per year) and rod fees that will vary from \$40.00 to \$130.00. There is no limit to the number of times you can use the club in a calendar year. Only one-half of the general membership will use the club in a given year, and on average, members use it only 1.6 times a year. A day is defined as "when you arrive to when you leave." As an added bonus, the club is sensitive to weather conditions that render a river un-fishable, conditions like thunderstorms and resulting mud, and will not charge you for the day provided you contact them before leaving the property.

As a member, you are allowed a guest or guests — the limitation is how many people the river will allow. Guests will be required to fill out an agreement and release form that the club will retain on file.

The club does not provide guide services. However, several members of the club are guides and arrangements can be made independently between members for a guided day of fishing.

As if these benefits are not enough, several of the properties have cabins available on the water — and they are quite reasonable. The Little Snake River above Steamboat Springs has a cabin with all indoor plumbing for a mere \$30.00 per night! It is not necessary to rent the cabins to have access to the fishing areas.

All anglers are aware of the fact that run-off renders a river or stream un-fishable. The Rocky Mountain Angling Club has lakes!

The membership runs a calendar year, January to December, unless you join in September. The first year, your membership will run from September to December of the following year.

# **GO FISH THE TAYLOR & GUNNISON RIVER**

## **Weekend Trip - September 11 - 12**

**D**o you want an opportunity to catch a trophy? Do you want to just have the opportunity to catch any size trout? Then this is the trip for you. There are so many options to explore on this trip that you might want to extend the weekend.

### **Taylor River**

The Taylor contains deep pools, pocket water, and plenty of riffles and runs. The water releases from Taylor Reservoir provide constant and predictable flows, and consistent hatches throughout the fishing season. The Taylor River contains a very high density of trout, including wild browns, rainbows, and cutthroat. Some rainbow trout are also stocked during the season. The upper section of the Taylor River just below the dam is designated catch-and-release water. This is trophy trout water with a lot of fish in the 8- to 12-pound range, along with some much larger fish. These big wild trout enjoy a constant food source which includes a steady diet of mysis shrimp and midges. This section can be very challenging and requires some technical angling skills. The rest of the river is much easier to fish and reports of 20- to 30-fish days are not uncommon. There is plenty of public access throughout Taylor Canyon. It can be a difficult river to wade; therefore use a wading staff for added safety. Chest waders are recommended. A 9-foot 5-weight fly rod is a good all-purpose choice for the Taylor River.

### **Gunnison River**

The Gunnison River begins at Almont, Colorado, where the Taylor River and East River merge to form its headwaters. The river grows in size as it flows down through the Gunnison Valley and into Blue Mesa Reservoir. There are plenty of public access points for wading the river during summer and fall. The Gunnison River contains a very high density of trout, including browns, rainbows, and cutthroat. There are long riffles and runs, and a lot of deep pools which hold large trout. There are good hatches of stoneflies, caddis, and mayflies. Fall can offer excellent fishing on the Gunnison. The fall kokanee salmon run brings loads of hard-fighting sockeye salmon up the Gunnison River from Blue Mesa as they run all the way to

Roaring Judy Fish Hatchery on the East River. There is a catch-and-release season for kokanee from August 1 to October 31. Big trout will follow the salmon to feed on their eggs. A 9-foot 5-weight fly rod is a good all-purpose choice for the Gunnison River. A 6-weight rod can also be used during the salmon run.

### **Recommended Flies**

Several fly shops can give you more detailed reports just before the trip. Two options that are good choices for information are the Dragonfly Anglers [www.dragonflyanglers.com](http://www.dragonflyanglers.com) and Willowfly Anglers [www.willowflyanglers.com](http://www.willowflyanglers.com). Updates will be posted on cwfTalk for those that subscribe, or if you have signed up for the trip you will receive an email beforehand.

### **Lodging**

Jen Stevens, Three Rivers Resort Manager, has kindly offered a 10% lodging discount for members of Colorado Women Flyfishers if you stay two or more nights during our group trip. Just mention it to the person taking your reservations.

### **Camping**

If you are planning to camp you can make reservations for One Mile, Rosy Lane, and Lodgepole (to name a few). The website is [www.reserveamerica.com](http://www.reserveamerica.com). Note: I will be camping at Rosy Lane in Site Number five. Saturday evening we will be having a campfire and all members are welcome to stop by and share a few stories, laughs, and a marshmallow or two.



## GO FISH RMNP / BIG THOMPSON

Estes Park, CO. Sept. 25 OR 26

This is a favorite flyfishing destination for several of our members. It is such a favorite that we will be doing the day trip on both Saturday and Sunday due to popular demand (requested by several members at the August club meeting).

If you can't make it on Saturday, then plan on Sunday (or vice versa) and you are welcome to fish both days if you can.

The fishing is usually great and the scenery is incredible – it is Colorado, after all. There are a lot of fishing options - you can fish in the park or in the Big Thompson canyon for brookies, brown trout and the beautiful greenback cutthroat. A small rod is all you need to have a great time.

We will start both days by meeting at Kirks Fly Shop in Estes Park at 8 a.m. – departing at 8:30 a.m. After picking up some flies or just figuring out where you want to start your fishing day – we will head out.

### Directions to Kirks in Estes Park:

From Denver, take I-25 north to exit 243. Go west on Highway 66, through the town of Lyons. You will come to a T. Take a right hand turn; this is Highway 36. It will take you

into Estes Park. Kirks Fly Shop is on the left hand side of the street, a few doors down from the Dairy Queen and across from the City Hall.

If you want to head directly to RMNP to fish, but don't know where to start, just get to Estes Park and follow the signs to the Beaver Meadows entrance to the park. Take the first left, (Bear Lake Road) and go about 1.5 miles following the signs to Moraine Park. Turn right going toward Moraine Park Campground – there is parking all along the road and the water is close by.

The park fee per car is \$20. Golden Age members get in free. Carpooling is a good idea, to share the cost.

### What to Bring

3-5wt. rod, 5x leader and 4 and 5x tippet.

### Flies:

Pheasant Tails, Copper Johns, Stimis, Ants, Parachute Adams, Caddis dries and larvae. Kirks will fill us in on what is working well on the river.

## NEWS FROM THE WEB

CWFTalk is one of our best methods of communication to our members besides the member meetings and the newsletters. If you have not yet signed up for Google Groups cwfTalk, you need to create a Google account with your email account that you always use. Following that, go to the CWF web site member section and log in using our current members access userid and password. Right on the Members Home page is the Google Groups signup. **A Casting Tip From Jack Dennis - NO BROKEN WRIST.** The rod must flex to deliver energy to the line, which is what "casts" the fly. If the wrist breaks or doesn't stop at the right spot in the casting stroke, the rod won't flex properly. So, stop your arm at the 12 o'clock casting position, and don't break your wrist. As a training aid, try adding a thick rubber band behind the reel seat. Then slip the band around your wrist. Make a cast. If you feel the rod butt pull on the rubber band and cut into your wrist, your wrist is breaking (rotating).- excerpted from the Int'l Sportsmans Expo website.
