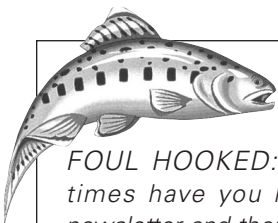

BACK CAST

JANUARY MEETING; TROUBLE ON THE SOUTH PLATTE

It is hard to believe that the ten-year anniversary of the Hayman fire that devastated the Deckers area is June 2, 2012, and yet the bitter scars remain unchanged. Blackened skeletons litter the monotone hillsides, and only occasionally are there faint signs of life in the wisps of underbrush and grass. The revelation that we will not see the area reforested to pre-fire condition in our lifetime is startling, and can bring a sense of melancholy to anyone who favors the area.

These monolithic changes are to the terrain; the river has suffered catastrophic changes as a result, and is in dire need of rehabilitation if the beloved fishery is to survive.

Duane Redford knows this all too well. He is a flyfishing guide on the South Platte River below Deckers and has watched the disintegration of the river during the last five years.

Duane is a man on a mission. He feels that the damage the which the river consistently sustains during every heavy rainstorm can be rectified. He is attempting to create a coalition to reverse the current damage, and nullify the problem of feeder creeks dumping tons (yes, tons) of sediment into the South Platte every time there is a heavy downpour, typically once a year.

The Colorado Division of Wildlife and Colorado Department of Transportation conducted a study of the area in 2009. Plans were made to place riprap along the river. The loads of riprap made it to the area – and then, plans were abandoned due to the need for another study.

Three and a half miles above Deckers have been improved and the streambed is holding, proof that the damage being done can be arrested. As it is, Horse Creek, located at the confluence of Hwy. 67 and Hwy. 126, is depositing 80 – 85 tons of sediment into the South Platte every year. Burned lumber and debris have caused Horse Creek's streambed to move seven times in the last ten years.

A property (referred to as "Stronks' Place" by Duane) lost its home in the fire. Owners rebuilt the home, but have lost their bridge seven times due to the amount of unchecked debris flowing out of several alluvial fans and into the South Platte during heavy rains. Drainage ditches have been installed, but without other improvements, they are quickly clogged with tons of decomposed granite. One to two million dollars will put "checks" on the alluvial fans, but they will need constant maintenance to remain effective. Without some type of coalition to oversee the area, this seems unlikely.

There was high fish mortality after the fire and the sediment has created a lack of holding areas for fish to winter. In addition, the fishing pressure remains high, due to the area's reputation and close proximity to Denver. The CDOW stocks the area with rainbow trout, but it is Duane's opinion that the fish are gone within two weeks of stocking. One more critical issue for the area is poaching. The area from the Wigwam Club downstream to the Scraggy View picnic area has special regulations: the bag limit is two fish, sixteen inches, period.

The negative impact that fire has had on the area and its trout population becomes very clear when you look at the electrofishing data provided by the Dept. of Wildlife.

One electrofishing station is 657 feet in length and is located approximately one-third of a mile upstream of Deckers. This station is affected by the Hayman and Schoonover Fires of 2002, with sediment impacts coming in from Schoonover Gulch, Wigwam Creek and Fourmile Creek.

Another electrofishing station is 610 feet in length and is located approximately two-thirds of a mile downstream of Deckers. This section of river has been affected by the Schoonover Fire of 2002, with sediment impacts coming in from Schoonover Gulch, Wigwam Creek, Fourmile Creek and Horse Creek.

As you can see, this problem will not mend of its own accord. March 10

The First Club Trip of 2012

Okay, so you've found your fishing gear, and cleaned it up (shame on you for not cleaning it last fall!), mended it, fixed it, replaced it or borrowed whatever else you need. Now, you are ready to tackle the Dream Stream. This three-mile section of the South Platte River between Spinney Mountain Reservoir and Eleven Mile Reservoir can be both a pain and delight. The landing of a 20+-inch fish can be a delight, but the wind can be a pain. Come prepared with both a camera for the fish and your winter gear for the unpredictable Colorado weather.

Equipment and Flies

Bring a 5 or 6 wt. rod with 4 or 5 wt. leaders and tippet to match. Flies include: midges, RS2s, top secrets, black beauties, jujubee red midge patterns, glo bugs (eggs) orange/peach 22-24, and streamers have been used in the past. Check with your favorite fly shop to see what is going on closer to the trip date.

Carpooling

Meet at the RTD Park 'n Ride on the southwest corner of Hampden (Highway 285) and Wadsworth Boulevard at 6:45 a.m. We will leave at 7:00 a.m. sharp.

Directions

Drive west on Hwy. 285 to Fairplay. Just past Fairplay go left on Hwy. 9 for 18 miles to a T in the road. Turn left (east) onto Hwy. 24 and continue through the town of Hartsel. Turn right (south) onto 23 Road; at the T turn left onto 592 Road. At 59 Road turn right. There is a free parking area at the bridge. If you arrive later, it will be easy to spot us along the stream. Remember, the fish are moving upstream out of Eleven-mile Reservoir towards Spinney Reservoir, so look for most of us to head west and fish back to the bridge.

(The entrance to Spinney Reservoir is closed until April 15.)

CACHE LA POUFRE RIVER Fort Collins, Colorado Day Trip with Northern Chapter Saturday, April 21

The Cache la Poudre River is located northwest of Fort Collins. It is about a two-hour drive from Denver. This is a freestone river (not fed by a dam). The first part of the canyon is steep and narrow but as you travel west, it opens up with several pull-off campgrounds and picnic areas. There are two sections designated as Wild Trout Waters which provide prime fishing.

In April, we are hoping to be at the peak of the Blue Wing Olives and possibly the start of the Caddis hatch. We will have a trip sign-up sheet and buddy list at the February/March/April meetings. In the event of low water conditions we will relocate this trip - check cwfTalk for updates. Mark your calendar.

Good News for the San Juan River below the Navajo Dam in New Mexico

In early December, 2011, a \$350,000 trout habitat improvement project (taxpayer funded) was essentially completed in the Braids area above Texas Hole in the San Juan River, and the area was reopened to fishing. There were four primary goals: 1) increasing water flow into the Braids during the winter's lower flows; 2) minimizing the siltation of the Kiddy and Texas Holes from runoff of an arroyo (wash); 3) providing deep pockets for fish habitat; and 4) enhancing the angling experience.

1) A large berm (back filled and vegetated) was constructed above two islands at the top of the Braids, adjacent to the main channel, to divert more water into the Braids. Side channels allowing water to return to the main channel from the Braids were closed off.

2) A large retention pond was constructed adjacent to the Texas Hole parking lot to hold and divert runoff from a wash. Overflow runoff will move into an adjacent low area and the water (minus most of the silt) will then make its way to the Braids, sparing the siltation of the Kitty and Texas Holes.

3) Twenty DEEP holes were dug in the bedrock in the Braids to create new habitat for trout. Some side channels and islands within the Braids were closed off/consolidated/revegetated to enhance flow to the deep holes.

4) Carol Stegink and I, unknowing of what had been done, traveled to the San Juan River just before Christmas and benefited from the project. We fished the lower Braids and can attest to more fish and bigger fish landed. A Float n' Fish employee told us that large trout normally holding in the main channel in the winter were moving into the Braids before construction was completed!

The following is the third provision in our Articles of Incorporation (first paragraph).

THIRD: The Corporation is organized and shall be operated exclusively for charitable, educational and scientific purposes within the meaning of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), and particularly to promote, encourage, and educate women in the sport and ethics of flyfishing, and to provide a supportive environment wherein each member can enhance her flyfishing knowledge, skills and enjoyment. No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation may consist of carrying on propaganda or attempting to influence legislation. ■

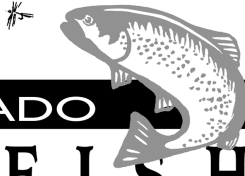
