

BACK CAST

PAT DORSEY!

The 2013 season started off with a bang! Our new Vice President, Kellie Heatherly, was able to wrangle THE Pat Dorsey, to give a presentation on the virtues and challenges of winter fishing. While many anglers are content to stay indoors and “replenish boxes, read books, watch DVDs and tell lies,” Pat is a big fan of the peaceful environment winter has to offer.

Technically, winter fishing takes place between November 1 and March 31. These are the toughest months to catch fish — cold and short days, but the benefit is little to no fishing pressure on the rivers. Ten to three o'clock is the feeding window in the cold temperatures.

Where to fish is key. Choose tailwaters for the winter. Tailwater is the river that flows from a bottom release dam, as opposed to a freestone river that originates with cold alpine drainages. Freestone rivers freeze in winter: they can be fished, but the tailwater rivers are more productive and can be fished during the cold winter months due to the striation that occurs. The most important thing to know about striation is that it causes cool water to release into the river in the summer, and warm water in the winter. Tailwaters can freeze in the winter, but usually the first few miles are ice free.

We all know fish are fickle, and winter exaggerates this. Forty degrees is really the minimum for catching fish. Any colder and the challenge compounds since fish will quit eating! In colder temperatures, fish will feed once every two to three days. Fifty-five degrees is ideal because at this temperature fish will feed three times a day. It is vital to find feeding fish. If they are “hunkered down” on the bottom then move on because you will not catch these fish. Choose slow-moving, deep runs. Stay away from fast water and carry a thermometer.

If you are “visually challenged” (like most of us!) don't forget your magnifiers! Small midges are the standard, although at the Pueblo tailwater, fish will hit dries even in the winter. How small, you ask? Size 22, 24, and 26 — yikes! Pat says, “think simple, sparse and small; spot and stalk.” Look for pods of five to seven fish, wear drab clothing, and be stealthy! Keep in mind that south-facing banks will be easier to negotiate (they receive more sun and melt during the day).

Use a conventional two or three fly nymphing rig, but Pat prefers to use yarn as a strike indicator. It is the most sensitive in the low, slow, clear water, especially with lethargic winter fish who have a much more delicate take, and the yarn indicator does not cause the disturbance to water surface that other indicators do. Minimize casting to eliminate icing on the eyelets and guides and use the high-sticking method to avoid icing.

CWF member Chris Juvan asked an important question regarding fish mortality in the cold. It is Pat's position that although the fish are sluggish, he has not had significant mortality in the cold, and it is his opinion that catching in the the heat of summer is far more detrimental to fish.

Colorado has some excellent tailwater fishing including, but not limited to:

The Arkansas River below Pueblo Dam, Pueblo
Blue River below Dillon Reservoir, Silverthorne *
Frying Pan River below Ruedi Reservoir, Basalt *
So. Platte River below:

1. Spinney Mountain Reservoir, Hartsel (this stretch is known as the Dream Stream)
2. Eleven Mile Reservoir, Lake George
3. Cheesman Reservoir, Deckers
 - a. Cheesman Canyon
 - b. Deckers area

Taylor River below Taylor Reservoir, Almont *

Williams Fork River below Williams Fork Reservoir, Parshall

Yampa River below Stagecoach Reservoir, Steamboat Springs

* These three reservoirs have mysis shrimp that can be found in the rivers below the dams.

Pat is Guide Director and partner in the Blue Quill Angler fly shop. Pat also writes the central Rocky Mountain stream report that monitors stream flows and conditions on the Blue, Colorado, South Platte (Cheesman, Deckers, Spinney Mountain Ranch, and Elevenmile Canyon), North Fork of the South Platte, and Williams Fork rivers.

THE BULLETIN BOARD EDITION; GET READY FOR THE 2013 SEASON!

If you haven't gotten out your fishing gear yet, you better get a move on because our first trip is in March. Yes, that is next month!

Our first outing will be to the **So. Platte R. at Deckers**. This is tailwater fishing below the Cheesman Dam, where the fish are starting to wake up from the long winter and feed.

The **Arkansas R. , Salida** trip will be a week earlier this year, April 26. If you can only do one Club trip this season, this is the one. There are many reasons: the flyfishing, the Saturday night dinner/party and the best company. Make your reservations early, as this is our most popular trip.

The **North Platte R. at Grey Reef** in Wyoming is our first out-of-state trip. Here you can take a fantastic float trip or wade fish for some large rainbows. Make your reservations now.

While the rivers are running high and fast, we will do some lake fishing at the **Aurora Reservoir**. This water holds brown trout, rainbow trout, largemouth bass, shiners, crappie, wipers and even catfish. You can bellyboat or fish from shore.

So. Platte R. in Eleven Mile Canyon is always a great area for spotting fish and enjoying the spectacular scenery

Boulder Creek and **Clear Creek** trips will provide fishing away from high water and are close to home

The three rivers of the **East, Taylor, and Gunnison** will be a fun time, flyfishing many waters. A Saturday night party with members of the eight-river rodeo in Almont is a must. Make your reservations early.

Get ready for the **overnight horseback trip/hike camping trip** scheduled for Rocky Mountain National Park, where

we will fish high mountain lakes and streams. The Girls on the Fly will also be joining us. Dry flies and a small rod are the ticket here. Send in your deposit NOW.

The **Brainard Lakes** are located in Indian Peaks Wilderness Area and close to home with some dry flyfishing opportunities. You can practice your casting on the pond or take off to do small creek fishing. Bring your bellyboat.

Our last weekend trip will be the **San Juan R.** below the Navajo Reservoir in northern New Mexico. It will test the best flyfishers among us. But, don't let that deter any of you from coming. This is a unique place. You can sight fish for big boys all day and get lost in the braids. There is nothing quite like it. *Make your reservations early!*

The favorite local area called the **Dream Stream (So. Platte R)** is always a producer of fighting fish. Some fish from Eleven Mile could start coming up early to spawn and give us a challenge.

The **Blue River** in October will be close to home and is always a challenge for big fish.

I hope there is something here that suits your fancy and I hope to see you on the river! More information for each trip will be published in future newsletters. Club trips will be reviewed periodically and location changes made, if needed. Every attempt will be made to have a trip on the specified date; however, the location may change due to water and/or fire conditions. SOUTH PLATTE RIVER, DECKERS Day Trip: March 23

Join us for the first official CWF trip of 2013! Deckers is a great winter fishing destination because it is a tailwater. A tailwater fishery is a river that comes out of the bottom of a dam. Consequently, during the winter months the water temperatures are just warm enough to keep some of the river ice free. The sections of the river where the sun hits the water are where you may find feeding fish. This time of year can be the most productive for solitude-seeking anglers who aren't afraid of using light tippets and very small flies.

ARKANSAS RIVER, Salida, Colorado Weekend Trip: April 26 - 28

This is the trip everyone looks forward to! You won't want to miss out on this one, as over 50 members and guests battle with the brown trout in the cold waters of the Arkansas River. We hope our timing is right for the Mother's Day Caddis Hatch, for which this river is famous, but come prepared. Provided that a rogue storm doesn't blow out the river, we generally educate large numbers of these wild brown trout by using the skills attained at the April CWF Clinic.


