## BACKCAST

### 8 RIVER RODEO

Clint Crookshanks of the 8 River Rodeo stopped by the Club Member's meeting at Piccolo's in June to give us some details about the tournament coming up July 26 – 28, beginning in Glenwood Springs. The tournament supports three worthwhile charities, and in the past has hosted two-person teams from around the world. The charities are: Trout Unlimited, Project Healing Waters and Samaritan's Purse. Donated prizes are awarded for first and second place, but considering there are typically 25 – 28 teams entered, the odds aren't so bad. Clint says that only one or two 20 – 30" fish can get you the win, provided you and your partner catch one fish each in all eight rivers.

Anyone can enter (the tournament accepts up to 40 teams), the rules specify that only one pro is allowed per team. You can fish nymphs, dries and even streamers! The good news is; any fish counts — white fish, carp and suckers! Even the peewee trout count, if you choose. If peewees aren't your style and you are a gambler, the first fish can go back into the water and you can try again. Make sure you will be satisfied because the second fish is the last chance — you must take it even if the first fish was larger! There is some personal integrity required, since the tournament relies on the honor system.

Choosing a partner that you can sync with is a good plan, since there is strategy in teamwork. Being on the same page is needed. This is not a stress-free experience. Catching a fish is a must; not an option. The cost is \$129 for each person in your team. Rules and registration forms can be found at [www.8riverodeo.com](http://www.8riverodeo.com). ■

## GO FISH CLEAR CREEK

### DAY TRIP; JULY 20, IDAHO SPINGS, CO

Clear Creek is a local fishing area along the US 6 and I-70 corridor. This small stream starts at Loveland and Jones Passes and flows to the plains, to Commerce City, where it joins the South Platte (66 miles later). The fishing is improving due to efforts of Trout Unlimited and local municipalities, as it was mined heavily in the 1800's. It is popular with rafts and kayaks as runoff is tapering down, but the fish move back to their favorite spots anyway.

The population of brook trout, brown trout, cutbow trout, cutthroat, and rainbow can be found in the fun pocket water.

There are many places to pull off US 6. It is rocky and is channeled. So we will decide which ones to check out as it gets closer to the fishing date.

#### Carpools

Coming from Denver: take exit 244 on I-70, head east on US 6 and park across from Kermits Road House

#### What to Bring

Best flyfishing rod: 9', 4- weight  
Recommended leader: 7 - 1/2 Feet  
Recommended tippet: 5X  
Best floating fly line: Trout DT  
Best sinking fly line: Streamer Stripper  
Sink Tip

#### Recommended Flies

Attractor Nymphs like Princes, Copper Johns and Pheasant Tails, sizes 14-18; Attractor Baetis and Mayfly patterns, size 16-20; Jujubaetis, size 20-24; Barrs emergers, size 20-24; San Juan worms, Carmelo Micro Egg patterns, size 14-16; Flashy midge patterns, size 16-20; Gray RS2, size 16-12; Dark grey WD40, size 20-24; Tungsten Head Prince, size 8; Peacock Prince, size 12-18; Dark Bead Brassie, size 20-26; Dry Adams, size 12-16; Parachute Ants, size 12-16; Hoppers, size 12-14; Caddis, size 16-18; and your favorite stimulator or streamer. Also Czech nymphing techniques can be very productive. Watch *cwfTalk* for current information as the time gets closer.

#### Miscellaneous

Your favorite lunch, water, sunscreen, good boots, waders, wade stick, polarized sunglasses, spare rod, hat, scarf for secret hand shake, and a big smile!

# **GO FISH THE EAST, TAYLOR, AND GUNNISON RIVERS**

**WEEKEND TRIP; JULY 26 - 28, ALMONT, CO**

The Taylor River is located in one of the most beautiful areas of Colorado. It flows out of Taylor Park Reservoir, which is on the west side of the beautiful Fourteeners you see from Buena Vista. The Taylor River connects to the East River downstream in Almont, to form the Gunnison River.

Immediately below Taylor Reservoir is a mile section of water which is home to some of the largest rainbows in Colorado. In 1997 a rainbow trout 34 inches long and weighing approximately 22 lbs. was caught and released there. This river holds many huge trout over 10 lbs., which can give any angler quite a thrill. The challenge is landing them, because they seem to know every trick there is to avoid being netted.

These fish fatten up on Mysis Shrimp, which drift out of the reservoir into the upper part of the river. Consequently the fish become very large and powerful. The river above the reservoir is also very fishable for fun smaller trout, ranging from 8-12 inches. Below the mile section are several other very good spots to fish, interspersed between private properties.

We might see the 8 River Rodeo competition while on the river, and we are invited to the Saturday night party being held at Almont Anglers.

## **Directions**

Take US 285 (from Denver), US 24 or US 50 (from Colorado Springs) to Buena Vista. Head into town and turn west on the Cottonwood Pass Road, Go over the pass to Taylor Reservoir, turn left and proceed down Taylor Canyon until you arrive in Almont. If the weather is bad, it is best to avoid Cottonwood Pass and take US 50 to Gunnison, then come back up to Almont.

## **What to Bring**

For trout in the area, the standard 5-weight with 7.5 foot 4x leader with 4x or 5x tippet. Bring a 3-weight rod for Spring Creek if you want to have fun with some little ones. Wade stick, sunglasses, sunscreen, hat and the secret hand shake are also recommended.

You will want to bring clothing for all types of weather, as it can rain, snow, sleet or hail any time of year.

## **Flies**

Copper Johns, Pheasant Tails, Hare's Ear, Prince Nymphs, biot midges, Miracle Midges will work for droppers and nymphing. If you plan to fish by the dam, bring along your Mysis Shrimp patterns. Those who enjoy throwing streamers will want to bring their assortment of woolly buggers. Before leaving town, you should check cwfTalk and an up-to-date fishing report at Three Rivers Resort & Outfitting, [www.3riversresort.com](http://www.3riversresort.com). You will want to bring clothing for all types of weather, as it can rain, snow, sleet or hail any time of year.
