

## BACK CAST

### APRIL MEETING - TWO FOR ONE!

The April Member meeting at Piccolo's was a two for one! Not only did the great Bill Edrington grace us, he brought Larry Kingrey along since, according to Bill and Larry, "bail for two is about the same as bail for one." Bill drew upon his comprehensive knowledge accrued over decades while owning the Royal Gorge Anglers fly shop and spoke about the virtues of the Arkansas River, while Larry tied the type of flies only a well-versed tier can tie.

At the time of the presentation, 2013 was shaping up to be an extraordinarily dry year, again taking its toll on the rivers. The Arkansas was as low as he had ever seen it, and run-off will be non-existent. Normal flow is around 400 cfs. On the day of the meeting it was at 200cfs. It is a sad state for the last great freestone river left. However, low water is very good for the fish (and nothing else). Fish don't have to fight the current to feed. Southern Greenback and Cheyenne Mountain Trout Unlimited Chapters revamped the river below the Pueblo Dam, in essence creating two different rivers: one above the dam, and one below it. According to Bill, a freestone river cannot be designated Gold Medal since there is no dam to prevent migration and the fish will move under pressure.

As far as the caddis hatch – "who knows?" Currently, there is a "robbing Peter to pay Paul" water management plan in effect to protect brown trout fry, which is negatively impacting the caddis hatches. In Bill's opinion there will never be another great caddis hatch again. The upside: this water management plan is supporting 4500 fish per mile and extraordinary BWO hatches. Bill said, "As a matter of fact, I have eaten them both and I like mayflies better!"

The water management plan has benefits: there is a 158% growth in fish over 10", and 23% of the fish are Hofer-cross rainbows that have been stocked for four years — and three out of ten are 16 – 18." The Hofer-cross rainbows spawned last year for the first time. It appears they are learning to live with the more aggressive brown trout that dominate the river. Currently, the percentage is 25/75, favoring brown trout.

The Canon City River Walk boasts 10,000 fish in a two-mile stretch of water! But it is heavily fished and fish are spooky. Wait until well after run-off (assuming there is one) to fish this area.

Successful fishing in the river means being flexible, and expect the unexpected. Be prepared for sporadic caddis hatches throughout the day, but typically in the evenings. BWO's will hatch on cloudy, overcast skies. In late April there will be one of the two – don't travel to the river with only caddis, or only BWO.

FYI: there is no such thing as an emerger stage of caddis — they are pupae and there are over 100 different caddis species in the Arkansas River. "Don't go buy a buttload of elk hair caddis! Buy four caddis and 24 CDC emergers, and do not go with only dry flies."

Bill advises not to float the Arkansas below 400 cfs – it will be a "butt-bump." He asked, "Why float the river in five minutes, when you can wade and catch fish for five hours?" Choose wading trips instead during low flows.

### **POP QUIZ**

Can you identify this trout species?

Tiger trout are a sterile hybrid of a female brown trout crossed with a male brook trout, with its name derived from the fish's pronounced vermiculations, resembling the stripes of a tiger (although it looks more like a leopard, if you ask me). Tiger trout are spawned at North Delaney Lake west of Walden. According to Colorado Parks and Wildlife, the hybrid tiger trout hatches at a meager 15 to 20 percent rate as compared to 85 percent for brown trout. Thus, availability of the tiger trout is limited, but don't we all love a challenge! Happy fishing!.Have questions or would you like to help? ## GO FISH GRAY REEF

MAY 10 - 12, WEEKEND TRIP, ALCOVA, WYOMING

Gray Reef, the extraordinary tailwater section of the North Platte River about 30 miles southwest of Casper, WY (near the town of Alcova) is our weekend destination on May 10, 11, and 12. Rainbows between 16-20 inches are quite common there and they are not the biggest you'll find on the river. Trophy trout over five pounds are common.

This section of the North Platte has become a popular destination, so don't expect solitude. The North Platte is a big river and there is always Wyoming wind, so consider bringing a heavier rod along with your 5-weight. These are heavy, strong trout so leave your small tippet at home, 3x is standard and 4x is as small as you should need.

### Directions

Take I-25 north to Casper. Take exit 188 South to get to WY220. Follow 220 about 30 miles to Gray Reef Reservoir.

### Lodging

There are many hotels and motels in Casper at exit 188 (which is only about 30 minutes from the dam). Among them are a Best Western, Hampton Inn, Hilton Garden Inn, La Quinta, Motel 6, Ramada and Quality Inn. Other lodging options include the Inn at Alcova, which provides cabins right near the dam (these fill up quickly) and Red Butte Ranch (a riverside bed and breakfast).

### Camping

There is BLM camping at both Gray Reef and Alcova Reservoir. There is also camping at the KOA Campground in Bar Nunn, [www.koakampgrounds.com/where/wy/50155/index](http://www.koakampgrounds.com/where/wy/50155/index), which is about 34 miles from the reef, — and at the Fort Caspar Campground between Casper and Gray Reef, [www.ficasparrcamp.org](http://www.ficasparrcamp.org). About 30 miles upstream of Gray Reef, there is camping along the Miracle Mile section of the North Platte. [ReserveAmerica.com](http://ReserveAmerica.com).

### Flies and Techniques

Most of the bugs, like the ever-popular scuds, are found near the river bottom. Therefore, that's where you'll find those big lazy trout. Set your nymphing rig so that you can get your flies deep using 12-foot leaders and lots of weight if you have to. woolly buggers and other streamers are known to attract the big boys.

The best fly combination for murky water is a bright red San Juan worm with

a small nymph on a dropper. Some suggested nymphs: midges (brassie, zebra midge, or your favorite pattern in cream, red, black). Or use scuds (olive, tan, orange #10-14) or blue wing olives (pheasant tails, RS2, or your favorite mayfly imitation), caddis nymphs and glo-bugs. Do not forget the famous Red Rock Worm. A good size range for all the nymphs is #16-22.

### Guided Wade or Float Trips


A guided wade or float trip can be arranged through the local fly shops. The North Platte River Fly Shop (307-237-5997) <http://www.northplatteflyfishing.com/seasons.php> is on the south side of WY220 between Casper and Alcova. The Ugly Bug Fly Shop (307-234-6905) is in town and the Reef Fly Shop (307-232-9128) has a small shop right at Gray Reef. You'll have a good chance to pick up any last minute items or get the current scoop at any of these shops. I have reserved four boats for our Club through Wyoming Fly Fishing Guide Service (307-277-6282) [http://www.wyomingflyfishing.com/guide/wyoming\\_fly\\_fishing\\_guides.aspx](http://www.wyomingflyfishing.com/guide/wyoming_fly_fishing_guides.aspx). The first who email me and send in their deposit to the guide service will get the boats.

A Denver area shop called Coloradoskies, which is located in Parker, also has guides. Theo Anest has spoken at our Club meetings and shared a lot of good information: [www.coloradoskiesoutfitters.com](http://www.coloradoskiesoutfitters.com)

A Wyoming non-resident daily fishing license is \$14 and you must also purchase and annual conservation stamp which is \$12.50. You can purchase it online at: <https://gf.state.wy.us/also/elsowelcome.aspx>. You can also purchase fishing licenses at the flyshops, and you must pay cash.

### Fishing on Your Own

Much of the land along the river is private. Helpfully, there are signs that mark the limits of the public access: a small blue sign indicates that the area is public; red means private. Here's a list of some of the public access points. All are identified by a number on this adjacent map. Wyoming Game and Fish also offers a detailed map of the access areas that can be reached using this website: [gf.state.wy.us/wildlife/access](http://gf.state.wy.us/wildlife/access).



**Robertson Road (1)** 6 miles from Casper on WY 220; turn onto Robertson Road and travel 1/3 mile; Facilities: none.

**Bessemer Bend (2a)** 11 miles from Casper on WY 220; look for sign; turn northwest onto Bessemer Road (County 308) and travel 2.0 miles; Facilities: toilet, wildlife viewing, boat ramp.

**Paradise Valley (2b)** 11 miles from Casper on WY220; look for sign; turn northwest onto Bessemer Road (County 308) and travel 2.8 miles. Dirt parking lot next to river; Facilities: none.

**Schmitt(3a)** 14 miles from Casper on WY 220; Facilities: camp.

**Sechrist (3b)** 15 miles from Casper on WY 220; look for sign; Facilities: toilet, boat ramp.

**By The Way Ranch (3c)** 18 miles from Casper on WY 220; look for sign; turn north on County Road 316; Facilities: toilet, boat ramp.

**Government Bridge (4)** 22 miles from Casper on WY 220; look for sign. Access also on west side of river, north from bridge; no dogs allowed, March 15 to May 1; Facilities: none.

**Lusby (5a)** 24 miles from Casper on WY 220; turn south onto signed WG&F road and follow to river; Facilities: toilet, boat ramp.

**Grey Reef (5 b)** 29 miles from Casper on WY 220; turn east onto County 412 and follow to river; Facilities: toilet, camp, boat ramp.

**Above Grey Reef (5 c)** 30 miles from Casper on WY 220; turn southeast just below Alcova Dam; parking and access on north side of road; Facilities: none.

## **GO FISH AURORA RESERVOIR**

**SATURDAY, MAY 25**

Come flyfish from a bellyboat on a reservoir for trout, large and small- mouth bass, yellow perch, crappie, walleye, wiper, and even your line-snapping tiger muskie. If you do not have a boat, rent a fishing boat at the Marina; see the website below. You can also walk the bank and fish. This reservoir is loaded. Bring your large midges, olive leeches and pheasant tails. Bring a lunch and plenty of water. 3.2% beer in cans only, no glass is allowed.

### **DIRECTIONS:**

Take I-225 to Parker Road, go south to Quincy Ave., (stay in left lane) and travel 8 miles east on Quincy to the entrance. Carpooling can be arranged at the entrance of the reservoir, Quincy and Powhaton Road.



Note: An entrance fee and boat fee are required, and dogs must be on leash only — they are not allowed in the water. Check regulations found in website below. Check it out at [www.aurorareservoir/reservoirs](http://www.aurorareservoir/reservoirs).

## **SNEAK PEEKS ELEVEN MILE CANYON LAKE GEORGE, CO WEEKEND TRIP JUNE 14-16**

Eleven Mile Canyon offers it all; there are pockets, pools, riffles, rapids, deep holes, and tons of insects with lots of fish.

It is an outstanding tailwater fishery that holds brown and rainbow trout. The South Platte River flows from Eleven Mile Reservoir into Eleven Mile Canyon, and access is from the bottom of the canyon in the town of Lake George, off of U.S. Highway 24. Follow the signs and you will be fine. The top two miles of Eleven Mile Canyon are Gold Medal catch-and-release water. This part of Eleven Mile Canyon holds the greatest concentration and quality of trout, although there are lots of fish throughout the entire canyon. The trout feast on BWO's, PMD's and midge patterns.

The road to the top of the canyon is rough, so take it easy. Several CWF members will be camping at the Spillway Campground (top of the canyon) while others are camping at the mouth of the canyon in Blue Mountain Campground.


